WORKING DURING YOUR STUDIES - Tier 4 students

- Check your visa it includes information about your entitlement to work.
- Students on degree level courses can work <u>up to 20 hours a week</u> during termtime and full-time during holidays - check when your official holidays are (PG students in particular)
- Students on sandwich courses can work full-time during their placement (and can also work up to 20 hours outside of the placement)
- You can do most kinds of work, but you must not engage in business, be selfemployed, provide services as a professional sportsperson or entertainer, or fill a permanent full-time vacancy.
- Make sure you understand the work restrictions.
- Never work more hours than you are allowed to or in a job which you do not have permission to do.
- Employer may ask for confirmation of term dates from the University





WORKING DURING YOUR STUDIES – EU/EEA/Swiss students

- Currently no restrictions on the number of hours or type of work you can do
- Currently no agreement reached on the terms of the UK's withdrawal from the EU sign up to UKCISA's Student news to stay up to date: www.ukcisa.org.uk
- All EU/EEA/Swiss students residing in the UK prior to the withdrawal date (+ any transition period which may be agreed) are eligible to apply for pre-settled status – attend our briefing on the EU settlement scheme to find out more:

NATIONAL INSURANCE NUMBER



- Your National Insurance number (NINo) is a unique personal number which is used to record your National Insurance contributions
- You do not need to have a NINo before starting work, but you must obtain one when you get a job
- Call the National Insurance number application line to apply

Monday to Friday, 8am to 6pm

- You'll get a letter from the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) asking you to come to a National Insurance number interview at Jobcentre Plus. The letter will also tell you which documents to bring to prove your identity.
- At the interview, you'll be asked about your circumstances and why you need a National Insurance number. You'll also be told how long it'll take to get your National Insurance number.

Employability is not simply about getting a job!










Turn to the person next to you...



Working during your studies

Getting a part-time job while you are studying can be a good way to get experience, improve your English and get to know the city of Nottingham. It can also be a useful way to earn extra money! You could also try volunteering (unpaid work) to get experience and improve your career prospects when you return home.

If you are studying on a Tier 4 visa you will probably be allowed to work for a maximum of 20 hours during term-time (but check the exact conditions of your visa). During university vacations you can probably work for as many hours as you want and, after you graduate, your Tier 4 visa probably allows you to work as many hours as you want until the date it expires.

Working in the UK after your studies

To get a job in the UK after you graduate you will first need to get an employer to sponsor you so that you can then apply for a Tier 2 (General) visa. This is not easy and only employers who appear on the official **Register**


